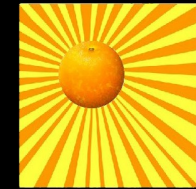

## What is “SECURE” COMMUNITIES ?

Secure Communities is a federal program that was implemented nationwide on January 2013. This program dictates that police stations across the nation can share information with ICE/Immigration to identify, categorize and deport undocumented people living in the United States.

This means that any ticket obtained which requires that your fingerprint be taken will be shared with ICE and processed to determine if you are undocumented or not. If you are identified by ICE as being undocumented, they will categorize you in one of 3 levels of priority for deportation.

**Information about the Federal “Secure” Communities Policy**

Levels of Priority for Deportation

**Level 1:** Individuals who have committed a felony

**Level 2:** Individuals who have committed one or more significant misdemeanors

**Level 3:** Individuals who have committed a minor misdemeanor or offense such as: a traffic violation, received a ticket without being arrested, or been cited for being an unlicensed street vendor

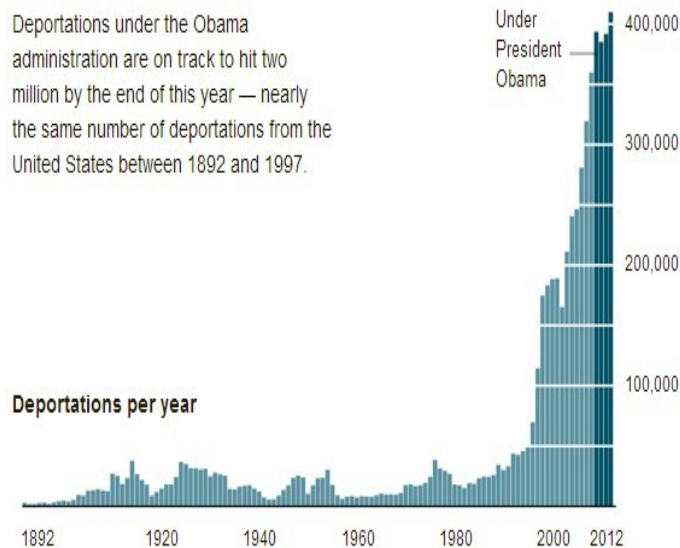
## How does “SECURE” COMMUNITIES affect us? Nationwide

A report put out by ICE earlier this year indicated that the number of people identified and deported under the “Secure” Communities program has increased 580% from 2009 (14,364) to 2012 (83,815)!

**It is projected that this year, deportations under the Obama Administration will reach a record high of 2 million people!**

(New York Times Report)

Deportations under the Obama administration are on track to hit two million by the end of this year — nearly the same number of deportations from the United States between 1892 and 1997.

- Convicted of some crime 111 (26%)

## How does “SECURE” COMMUNITIES affect us locally?

- From 2009 to 2012 police departments in California have already sent **4,323,080 MILLION** fingerprints to the Department of Immigration (ICE).
- This number is the highest in the nation.
- California has deported more people than Arizona.



State	# of individuals deported (Level 3)
CA (2009-2012)	23,628
AZ (2008-2012)	7,984

In 2012, ICE in collaboration with police departments in **Orange County**, identified and deported **8,700** people in total.

**THE CITY OF SANTA ANA HAS A CONTRACT WITH ICE!**

The city of Santa Ana has a contract with ICE for bed space. This contract can be cancelled at any time if the city council members propose it. The contract allows ICE to use the Santa Ana city jail as an ICE detention center.

This is how the city, in collaboration with the Santa Ana police department and ICE has been detaining people in the Santa Ana detention center. Records show that the majority of people who have been detained and deported did not commit any crime.

In 2008, the city of Santa Ana made **\$4.8 million** this way!
